Don't miss out on training grants to help skill your team

We encourage CITB NI registered employers to undertake training and make use of our grant scheme to help improve skills within the workforce. The CITB NI training grant scheme offers direct grants to registered employers to support a wide range of training and qualifications for employees working in Northern Ireland. The training is not limited to just the construction trades, it also includes Administration, Supervision and Management training. Have you achieved an initial 3rd Party Accreditation, don't forget our grant scheme also covers this.

The training grant funds are easy to claim, with employers encouraged to claim online via the website www.citbni.org.uk

To claim grants the deadline for all Levy Return Forms including the Options and New Registrations must be adhered to. Grants cannot be paid if you miss any deadline.

All grant claims must be received by CITB NI within three months of commencement of training or upon registration onto course or apprenticeship scheme, otherwise grant will be declined. If you are unsure what you are eligible to claim please contact our **Grants Team** on **028 9082 5466** for guidance.

Apprentice Grants

Skills shortages and an aging workforce are putting the industry at risk in particular in trade areas such as bricklaying, joinery and roofing.

CITB NI has enhanced apprenticeship grants available to CITB NI registered employers meaning that an employer can gain £5200[i] during the 3 year cycle of training an apprentice plus an additional £1500 from the Department for the Economy for employers who employ apprentices from the very start right through to completion of NVQ Level 2 and 3. 200 apprentices have been supported by this initiative over the past two years.

GRANT & LEVY

Levy

All Northern Ireland construction industry employers are required by law to register with CITB NI. Registered CITB NI employers are also obliged by law to complete the levy Return form every year.

The CITB NI levy means that all employers in the industry make the appropriate financial



contributions based on the annual levy rate of the wage bills (i.e. gross payments to PAYE employees and gross payments to labour only subcontractor payments) for work in Northern Ireland.

If your wages bill is greater or equal to £80,000 levy is payable on the gross emoluments at the annual levy rate. If below £80,000 you will not be liable to pay a levy but must still complete the Annual Return Form. This will allow you to benefit from CITB NI services including our grant scheme.

It is a legal requirement to complete the Annual Return Form. You can now complete the 2019 Annual Levy Return Form online at www.citbni.org.uk. The registered list of Levy Payers is now available to access online and you will be required to log in to access this. Your username

and password remain unchanged and you can find this at the top right of your previous Return or contact us on **028 9082 5466** or email levy@citbni.org.uk

Should I be Registered?

If you can answer YES to the following questions you should be registered with CITB NI

- Are you working in the construction industry in Northern Ireland*?
- 2. Are you an employer?
- 3. Are you working in Northern Ireland for 27 or more weeks in relevant tax year?

Too busy to leave your site? Let the Mobile Training Unit come to you

As long as you are based in Northern Ireland, the Mobile Training Unit (MTU) can come to you and provide short duration health and safety courses such as confined spaces, excavations, manual handling and working at heights, encouraging the industry to build safely.

The MTU provides training on site to all registered in-scope construction employers. It is a convenient way of meeting training requirements with minimum disruption to site work whilst also helping employers meet their legal responsibility.

Registered in-scope levy paying employers can book the Mobile Training Unit free of charge.

We provide the CISRS scaffolding training courses at Nutts Corner Training Centre. These courses include a five-day Basic Access Systems Erector Course (BASE) and a three-day Tube & Fitting Basic Scaffold Inspection course. On successful completion of these courses the relevant CISRS Scaffolding card will be issued.

These courses run alongside the existing CISRS programme of CISRS Operative Training Scheme (COTS), Scaffolding Part One, Part Two and Advanced courses working towards achievement of an NVQ and obtaining a Scaffolding or Advanced Scaffolding Card. The CISRS 2 Day Refreshers Course (CPD) is for people looking to renew a CISRS Scaffolder card (blue) and a CISRS Advanced Scaffolder card (gold).

This course will refresh your existing knowledge, make you fully aware of changes in legislation and good working practices, to align your skill-set with the contents of current CISRS Scaffolder/Advanced Scaffolder Courses.

CISRS is marking the second anniversary of the introduction of CPD courses for scaffolders by running a number of subsided courses for just £50 at a number of training centres throughout the UK. CITB NI are delighted to be one of the allocated centres. Find out more here.

Robert found an employer who supported him and made the necessary adaptations within the workplace to allow him to progress and is now a fully qualified painter and decorator with ambitions to start his own business.

Gerard was diagnosed with severe dyslexia which provided barriers within the education network to gain the relevant qualifications needed to achieve NVQ Level 3. Gerard worked with specialist tutors and explored non-traditional learning methods to gain his qualifications. He is now a fully qualified joiner and has retained employment with his employer who supported him with his NVO

CITB NI said, "Congratulations to both Robert & Gerard, who have both demonstrated that against all odds they have not given up despite personal difficulties and have achieved their construction qualifications and gained employment. Horizon 2020 BIMcert Project

CITB NI in partnership with Belfast Met and other European project partners from Ireland, Portugal, Croatia and Macedonia have secured a £1.25M (£1.11m) Horizon 2020 grant to develop BIMcert - a training model and toolkit to help all levels of the industry take their first, or next, step to working with BIM.

Building Information Modelling (BIM) is key to the built environment, as digital and virtual reality technology provides enhanced management on all aspects of the project lifecycle by all parties involved.

About the project

The project aims to develop a suite of training tools and electronic platform for any EU training provider to adopt and develop BIM/

digital construction skills throughout the industry. The intention is to ensure that all within the industry have a training module that will help them access and use the Information and visual Modelling that BIM / Digital Construction provides.

Industry Consultation

CITB NI conducted a survey across 5 countries in four languages, to identify the current level of BIM maturity, knowledge and understanding within Built Environment practitioners and academia, to establish current levels of sustainable design and construction practice.

To confirm the survey findings match industry requirements, all 5 partner countries hosted focus group / reality check workshops, the findings are being used by the

developers to compile the concept and methodologies along with the curriculum and training materials development.


An update of Northern Ireland (NI) Construction Industry Performance Indicators (Issue 15 - May 2019)

Construction Employment

- Construction employment in Northern Ireland is expected to grow ever so slightly at an annual average rate of 0.1% over the forecast period. The average annual UK rate remains positive at 1.3%. Employment is projected to reach around 61,910 in 2023, down from an estimated 62,400 in 2019¹.
- The NI industry will have to recruit an average of 500 new employees each year to realise forecasted construction output, with the

annual requirement highest for wood trades and interior fit-out (80), non-construction professional, technical, IT and other office-based staff (80), and other construction professionals and technical staff (80)².

• The FMB State of Trade survey shows a continuing trend of high demand for bricklayers and carpenters with 64% and 59% of employers respectively indicating shortages in these areas³. Meanwhile 41% of surveyors who responded to the RICS UK Construction and Infrastructure Survey Q1 2019 have increased their headcount over the last three months to support new work⁴.



Construction Output

- The total volume of construction output in the fourth quarter of 2018 decreased by 4.0% compared to Q3 2018 and was 1.7% lower than the same quarter in the previous year⁵. The decrease in the overall output in Q4 2018 from the previous quarter was accounted for by a 12% decrease in housing output, a 6.8% decrease in Repair and Maintenance, and a 0.4% decrease in New Work. Infrastructure was the only activity to increase from the previous quarter with a 13.3% increase.
- Construction output growth in Northern Ireland is projected to average 0.8% a year over the 2019 to 2023 period, a slower growth rate than across the UK as a whole (1.3%). Output is driven mainly by underlying demand for social housing (3.8%) along with steady output streams in the private housing sector (1.1%) and housing repair, maintenance and improvement work (3.2%)⁶.






State of Trade

- The FMB's State of Trade Survey for the UK for Q1 2019 shows that in the three months to March 19, SME workloads declined for the first time in six years as more respondents stated lower workloads (29% vs 13% in Q1 2018). Nearly half of respondents indicated no change to workloads, similar to the previous quarter. Expectations going forward are better with 41% forecasting higher workloads over the next 3 months. Eighty-eight percent of builders believe material prices will rise and 71% of construction SMEs forecast wage increases over the next 6 months. The report also shows that NI's net balance⁷ has increased from +32 in Q4 2018 to +41 in Q1 2019⁸.
- The Q1 2019 RICS UK Construction and Infrastructure Market Survey shows a decrease in the rate of output growth with a net balance of only 9% of survey respondents reporting increased workloads compared to 11% in the previous quarter, the lowest reading in six years. Private housing remained steady while infrastructure workloads grew from 11% to 18% in Q4 20189.

New House Prices and Sales

The total number of NI residential property sales in 2017-18 (Q4 17 - Q3 18) stood at 23,830, a 0.4% decrease on the same period in 2016-17 (23,924). In terms of new house sales, for the period Oct 17 - Sept 18, there were 1,468 sales, an increase of 15% on the figure from the same period the previous year (1,275)¹⁰.

The number of new dwelling starts (both private and social) increased in Q4 17 - Q3 18, from 7,813 in Q4 16 - Q3 17, to 8.177, a 5% increase¹¹.

The average price of a new dwelling in NI in Jul - Sept 18 stood at £173,600, an increase of 7% on the same period in 2017 (£162,500)¹².
